"On Simchat Torah, I learned about Hamas' egregious acts against Israel," she said. "At a time like this, when the Jewish people are threatened, there is only one thing to do: come together. My boyfriend and I went to Congregation Agudas Achim, where Rabbi Warshawsky serves as Rabbi in Residence, and we sang, danced, and celebrated receiving the Torah. The synagogue was filled with proud Jews exuding immense joy. I am forever thankful to Schechter for such an incredible connection to Rabbi Warshawsky, as well as countless others I've met as a result of Schechter connections."
