In the aftermath of the terrorist attacks in Israel, Aliza (Rudolph) Scheier (SSDS '99) organized a grassroots fundraising effort with her peers called Moms for Tikkun Olam. The women made blue and white beaded bracelets that contained expressions of Israel solidarity: Tikkun Olam, Shalom, Ahava, and Fearless.

Word spread quickly on social media and across the Denver Jewish community, leading the initiative to raise \$70,000 through a combination of bracelet sales and partnerships with JewishColorado and an anonymous donor who matched the funds raised. Every dollar raised went directly to provide relief for Israeli families impacted by the war.

Aliza said she was inspired by the outpouring of support. "I heard from so many Jews from different chapters in my life, including my time at Schechter, all voicing encouragement and pride in our team. Perhaps my proudest moment came when my children participated in bracelet making, fostering their pride in Zionism through this hands-on experience."

Reflecting back on her Schechter education, Aliza noted, "The academic rigor and wide inclusion of thought always stood out to me. Indoctrination isn't the mission, rather a wideranging exposure of ideas with an open forum in which to share, learn, and debate, all with Jewish virtues and ethics inspiring the curriculum."

I find great connectedness to the wide network of Schechter alumni in the US and abroad. When I meet a fellow graduate, even if we have never crossed paths, I have come to value our shared experience which creates kinship based in Jewish tradition and culture that we learned at Schechter.
