Exploring responsibility and ritual for upcoming milestones

Last Friday, our 6th graders participated in a special day of programming to study and celebrate their upcoming milestone of becoming *B'nai Mitzvah*.



Students explored the *mishna* (oral Torah), which discusses the importance of a "crown of a good name" and what actions they need to take to create that "crown" for themselves. Implementing a PoP protocol (see the Q&A feature below!), the students examined a second *mishna* to learn what the rabbis teach us about the milestones of a Jewish life.



Thanks to Rabbi David Chapman and Rabbi Nate Crane for describing the meaning and significance of t'fillin and provided a step by step guide to wrapping t'fillin.



Students practiced their skills in a delicious way using Fruit by the Foot!

STEM, Judaic Studies, and creativity unite

These pieces were created with the laser cutter in our very own Makerspace. Our young artists then personalized them with designs of their choosing, resulting in custom pieces of Judaica for them to bring home and enhance their family Hanukkah celebrations.

Reading Buddies program creates cross-grade connections

An expanded Reading Buddies program—promoting opportunities for Sager School students to build relationships across grade levels—is now underway!



Matched groups of 1st & 7th graders and 3rd/4th & 8th graders met during the first monthly program session. 1st graders enjoyed time to read books aloud with their buddies, followed by a shared recess to socialize and practice skills like mastering the monkey bars or tying shoes. 3rd and 4th graders benefited from academic guidance from their new mentors—selecting material to work on according to their interests, including working on chapter books, Torah *pesukim* (verses), and math problems.

"As we explore the theme of *chesed* (acts of loving-kindness) with our 7th & 8th graders, it's valuable to show that we don't always need to go outside of the building to help others. The Reading Buddies program brings the school community closer together—our younger students can form a sibling-like bond with older students and receive academic help, and our older students step into leadership roles and give their time in a memorable way."



Last week, the ECC began their exploration of Hanukkah with the *morot* intentionally displaying Hanukkah materials and objects throughout the classrooms.

In Alonim Bet, the *yeladim* discovered a captivating center adorned with a cover, *Hanukkiot* and dreidels. Drawn in by the inviting set-up, their curiosity and initiative took hold—one child requested candles, another suggested lighting them, and a dialogue on light and darkness followed.

This is Faye's third year as a school leader with Hadar Institutes's Pedagogy of Partnership (PoP), which provides cutting-edge professional development and resources for educators, school leaders, and families to enable learners of all ages to develop the habits of wonder, empathy, and responsibility toward others and Torah.

You were recently featured in Hadar's PoPSchool Leader Spotlight. What is Schechter's approach to teaching and studying Torah?

A: PoP's philosophy is "How we learn is what we learn," and Schechter has adopted this approach. We focus on *havruta*-syle learning (Aramaic for "friend") and help students build the skills to learn with another person in a way that deepens their learning and relationships. *Our goal is to help students gain the tools to engage with a text, with another person, and with the world.*






