On Yom Hazikaron, our 8th graders led our school *kehillah* (community) in a *tekes* to remember the fallen soldiers in Israeli wars and the victims of terrorism. The *tekes* began with the lowering of the Israeli flag followed by the *El Malei Rachamim* prayer, and included readings in English and Hebrew, a dance performance, a video tribute to honor fallen soldiers and victims of October.

On the morning of October 7th, David, his wife Yarden, and their four children were in their home in Kibbutz Kfar Aza while terrorists infiltrated their kibbutz. When they emerged from their shelter after 20 hours, they discovered that all of their extended family had survived, however close friends had been killed, students and staff from David's school — Nofei Basor High School, where he served as principal — had been killed, and a number of close friends and their children had been taken hostage. As principal, David spent the first three months after October 7th attending all of the funerals and developing an emergency educational program for all of his students.

David and his family are visiting the Chicago area for a brief respite. He will be sharing his family's story and describing the three critical elements of the educational emergency program that he developed for the students.
